Note: Digraphs like “wh” must be seen and spelled as one unit (Spelling Pattern or grapheme). It is not a blend of /w/ and /h/ sounds, but a separate speech sound (phoneme).

Note: It is optional if “whether” is pronounced exactly the same as “weather” (/w/ at the beginning), or if it is pronounced with a /hw/ sound at the beginning.

Note: The /z/ sound is more often made by the letter “s” as in “has.” See Lesson 4.
