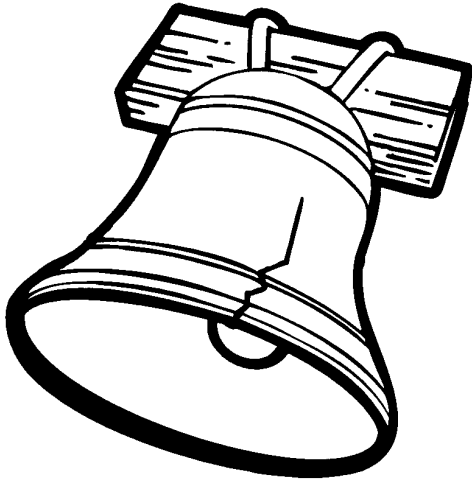

# The Liberty Bell



The Liberty Bell symbolizes American freedom from British rule. It was rung on July 8, 1776, in Philadelphia after the first public reading of the Declaration of Independence. The bell weighs 2080 pounds (943.5 kg) and its circumference is 12 feet (3.7 m).

The bell was ordered for the United States in 1751. Ironically, it was cast in London. It arrived in Philadelphia in August 1752 and was cracked while being tested. It was melted down, and a second bell was cast in April 1753. However, this bell also had flaws. A third was cast in June of that year. On June 7, 1753, the third bell was hung in the tower of Independence Hall.

In 1777, during the American Revolution, British troops occupied Philadelphia. Concerned Americans removed the bell from the tower and took it to Allentown, Pennsylvania, where they felt it would be safer. A year later, it was returned to Philadelphia and replaced in Independence Hall.

The Liberty Bell was rung on every Fourth of July and during every state celebration until 1835. That year, it cracked as it was being rung for the death of Chief Justice John Marshall. The Liberty Bell now hangs in a glass pavilion near Independence Hall.
